



First Sunday of Lent



A Note from our Music Director

During the Eucharistic Prayer of Mass, after the celebrant elevates the host and chalice, he decrees: "the mystery of faith." At this point, we as a congregation reply with one of three responses. The one we will be singing on Sundays during Lent acclaims, "Save us, Savior of the world, for by your Cross and Resurrection you have set us free." During Lent we prepare ourselves to celebrate the saving acts of Christ's Cross and Resurrection by fasting, prayer, and works of charity. Just as we prepare ourselves for Holy Week and Easter, we hear this weekend how Jesus was tempted by the devil and fasted forty days to prepare for his public ministry. We hear about the need for forgiveness because of Original Sin of Adam and Eve in the first reading; in the second reading, we are reminded that because of this sin, Jesus came to save us.

Our hymns this weekend directly state how we need to open our hearts to this fasting, just as Jesus fasted in the desert. As I stated last week, the music shouldn't make us sad, but instead should instill a longing and a sense of penance within us. Take the words of the hymns and psalms to heart. Our opening hymn states, "teach us to discipline our wills and follow, Lord, your way," while our offertory hymn acclaims, "keep, o keep us, Savior dear, ever constant by your side: that with you we may appear at the eternal Eastertide." There is nothing sad about these texts; rather, they instill in us a deeper prayer to better our lives.

The Psalms used in Mass reinforce the other Scripture readings of the day, and can be a point of increased study and reflection. Psalms can be also used during other points in Mass, such as the opening antiphon or at communion. While the Gregorian Chants and hymns we use in Catholic Liturgy are wonderful commentaries on the day's readings, the Psalms have something extra special that can often be overlooked – Jesus himself prayed and sang these same psalms! His last words on the cross in Matthew's Gospel which will come in this year's A cycle readings of Palm Sunday - are a direct quotation from Psalm 22: "My God, My God, why have You forsaken me?"

So in your extra reflections during this season of Lent, like Jesus did, pray some of the Psalms. A great Psalm for the Lenten Season (used both on Ash Wednesday and at today's Mass of the First Sunday of Lent) is Psalm 51: the Psalm of the Repentant Sinner. This Psalm is also the text of this weekend's postlude, the German chorale "Erbarm dich mein, o Herre Gott" - Have Mercy upon me, O Lord God. Each weekend when we pray the Memorial Acclamation asking our Savior to save us by His cross and resurrection, and as we sing our Lenten hymns, let us, even more than ever, be attentive to their words and what we are all about during these forty days: increased reverence and prayer.

Fasting means eating a lesser amount of food. Catholics 18 and not 60 years of age must fast. The days on which we must fast are Ash Wednesday and Good Friday. Days of abstinence are days on which we do not eat any meal at all. Dairy products, fish and seafood are allowed. All Catholics over the age of 14 must abstain. The days of obligatory abstinence are Ash Wednesday and all Fridays of Lent. On Ash Wednesday and Good Friday, both the laws of fasting and abstinence apply and no meat may be eaten.

Saturday March 7 Deuteronomy 26:16-19 Ps 119:1-2,4-5,7-8 Matthew 5:43-48 How do you deal with temptation? That's the personal challenge given to us by the Word of God on the first Sunday of Lent. And so we begin our journey with Jesus, traveling to the holiest place we can reach at this point in our lives.

This Lent is like no other. Last year, you had different needs, different areas of growth, different levels of insight and understanding. Much has happened since then, and all of it is a preparation for what the Lord is going to do in your life right now.

What victory do you need? What needs to be resurrected? To get there, Jesus will lead you through the cross of penance and self-denial, into his tomb, and out into God's light where his love provides healing and new life.

During Lent – and every time we make sacrifices and connect our sufferings to the Passion of Christ – we follow Jesus to the cross and to resurrection. This involves seeing our own crosses in a new light, for the Calvary Road is the only way to reach the victories that we yearn to experience.

If we want Easter to be more than just a holiday of colored eggs, chocolate bunnies and big dinners, we have to make Lent more than just 40 days of enduring an annoying, obligatory sacrifice, eating meatless pizza on



Fridays, and going to an occasional extra event at church.

If we want to experience the power of resurrection, we have to experience the power of mourning and repenting from our sinfulness. In other words, we have to experience the powerlessness of death – the death of our selfishness, the death of our worldliness, the death of our behaviors that

are not like Christ's.


Reflect & Discuss:

- 2. In the reading from Romans, we hear about the abundant grace and the gift of justification that Jesus provided to each of us when he died on the cross. How does this grace and justification give us life? In other words, how does God help us to resist sin?
- Looking at the Gospel passage, what did Jesus have to die to in the desert so that he could say no to temptation?

Lenten Activity:

What can you do this week to die to self? For example, think of a good deed you can do that's the opposite of what your selfishness wants you to do.

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
