

Saint Simon the Apostle Feast Day October 28th

Saint Simon the Apostle, also call Simon the Zealot, one of the Twelve Apostles. In the Gospels of Mark and Matthew, he bears the epithet Kananaios, or the Cananaean, often wrongly interpreted to mean "from Canaan. The titles given him was an attempt to distinguish him from the apostle St. Simon Peter.

Nothing further is known about him from the New Testament. He preached the Gospel in Egypt and then joined the apostle St. Judas (Thaddaeus )in Persia, where, according to the apocryphal Acts of Simon and Judas, he was martyred by being cut in half with a saw, one of his chief iconographic symbols.



### **ST. JUDE THE APOSTLE** FEAST DAY OCTOBER 28TH

Jude, also known as Judas Thaddaeus was also one of the Twelve Apostles of Jesus according to the New Testament. He is generally identified with Thaddaeus, Judas Thaddaeus. In the Roman Catholic Church, he is the patron saint of desperate cases and lost causes.

Saints Jude's attribute is a club. He is also often shown in icons with a flame around his head. This represents his presence at Pentecost, when he received the Holy Spirit with the other apostles. Another common attribute is Jude holding an image of Jesus Christ, known as the Image of Edessa. In some instances, he may be shown with a scroll or a book or holding a carpenters rule.
