

An A CHRISTMAS

OSTIA: is again available this Christmas season in the Rectory. There is no need to call ahead, just stop at the rectory between 9:00 a.m. and 2:30 p.m. to purchase at \$6.00 per box of fifty (50).

HOST:

- 1 cup lukewarm water
- 1 cup flour
- 1 tsp. + few drops of oil

Dash of salt

Beat mixture for 5 minutes. Let stand 5 hours, stirring every half hour. (This recipe is for use with an Ostia maker and if none is available, you may purchase the Ostia at the rectory.)

Craig's Corner A note from our Music Director

Merriam Webster defines the word *silence* as "forbearance of speech and noise; absence of sound or noise." Even Church leaders wrote about silence in their documents about music in the Mass. They write,

> Music arises out of silence and returns to silence. God is revealed both in the beauty of song and in the power of silence. The Sacred Liturgy has its rhythm of texts, actions, songs, and silence. Silence in the Liturgy allows the community to reflect on what it has heard and experienced, and to open its heart to the mystery celebrated. Ministers and pastoral musicians should take care that the rites unfold with the proper ebb and flow of sound and silence. The importance of silence in the Liturgy cannot be overemphasized.

Monsignor last weekend in his homily spoke of quiet and silent prayer as a way to foster the Advent season. Silence is a major component to the Advent season. Understand, though, that silence doesn't mean sadness; we are to treat this season with joy! This weekend we hear Isaiah prophesy "A voice cries out: In the desert prepare the way of the LORD! Make straight in the wasteland a highway for our God! Every valley shall be filled in, every mountain and hill shall be made low." This is a joyful text, a joyful message; and the inspiration behind the opening hymn of today's Mass. In the secular world, the weeks leading up to Christmas are always busy and hectic – anything but silent and still. The Church in its rich history and Tradition gives us these four Sundays to separate ourselves from this hustle and bustle but rather, silently contemplate the coming of Christ.

John the Baptist, from whom we hear in the Gospel this weekend is an important figure to keep in our minds this season. Mark quotes Isaiah before he introduces us to John's character. Then John himself reminds the people that he is the forbearer of Christ, only preparing the people for the coming of the Messiah. Connecting this theme, this weekend's postlude is a setting of a German Advent chorale proclaiming of the coming of Christ, "Savior of the Nations, Come."

During this Advent season, let us take advantage of periods of silence so that we can prepare for the coming of Christ with the absence of the sounds and noise of the secular season we are bombarded with in the outside world.




Vocations Cross

Advent is a good preparation for Christmas – and meeting the Lord anew – if we use it to face our sins, reconcile with God, and follow Jesus back onto the holy path. If we neglect this opportunity, our lives will be barren of the strong faith we need during difficulties..

Prepare the way of the Lord! He has more love to give you, more healing, more joy! Make straight in the wasteland of your sins a highway for our

God. Go to the Sacrament of Reconciliation and create a wider road into your heart that's easy for Jesus to travel, a through-way upon which he can arrive in great speed and glory.

All humankind is as frail as grass, and all our glory is like the flower of the field that withers and wilts. Only the glory of God stands forever.



What are your troubles and struggles? Here is where Jesus wants to minister to you, and here is where you are most vulnerable to sin.

What in your life is going well? What activities are you doing that seem productive? Are any of them grassy glories that can wither away? A hundred years from now, will what you're doing today still have an impact – a beneficial impact?

God has given you talents and a calling, a special purpose that requires those talents. Yes, you! We are all called to have fruitful lives that make an eternal difference. Jesus wants to come straight to us to produce the fruits of his kingdom in our lives and in others.

Prepare for the Lord to make an eternal difference through you!


