The Lord's Baptism


The final line of this Sunday's reading from Matthew's gospel offer a clue about the meaning of Jesus's baptism. "This is my beloved Son, with whom I am well pleased." This echoes the first reading. "Here is my servant whom I uphold, my chosen one with whom I am pleased" (Isaiah 42: 7). By making this connection, the author of Matthew is testifying to the fact that Christians had come to believe that the "Suffering Servant" in Isaiah ultimately refers to Jesus Christ. It is Jesus who will be the definitive "covenant of the people" and "light for all nations." He will "open the eyes of the blind" and "bring out prisoners from confinement, and from the dungeon those who live in darkness." As another Christmas fades into the past and we prepare to move on next week to ordinary time, these readings help us to understand more fully the meaning of the incarnation-of why Christ has come.
